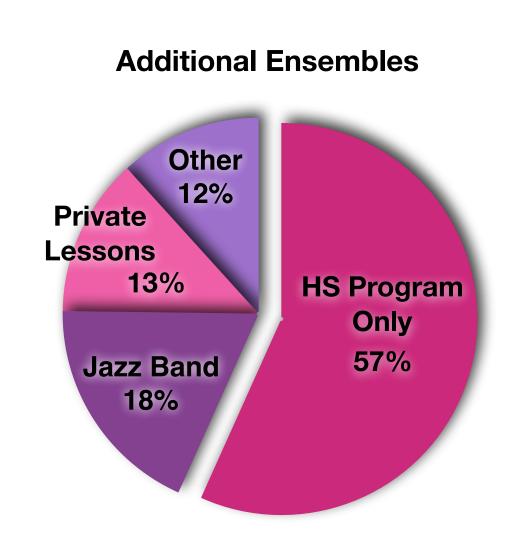
### Freshmen

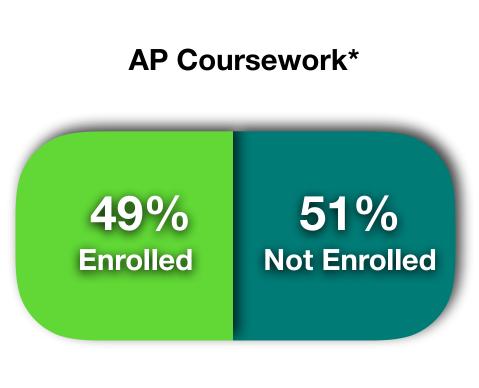
- What influenced high school freshmen band students to continue band in high school?

- What types of scheduling limitations and conflicts did the students encounter before signing up for band in high school?

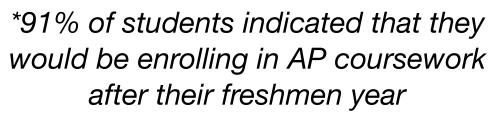
# **Findings**

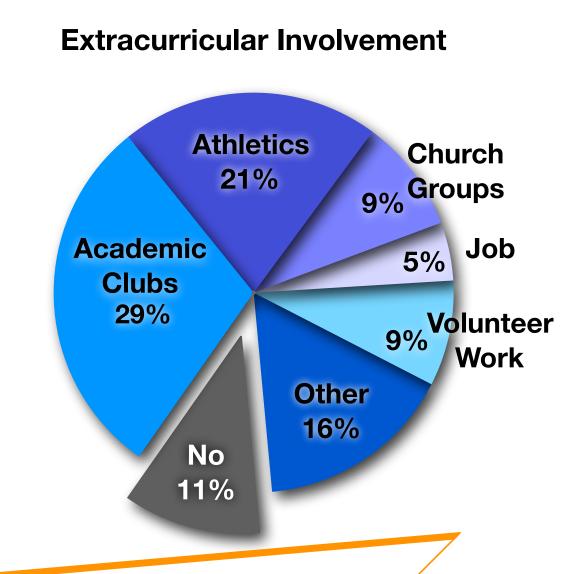
- ► Social and life experiences were rated the highest in students' decision to join HS band.
- ▶ 38% of students encountered scheduling conflicts when signing up for HS band.
- ► Potential involvement in more rigorous coursework and extracurricular involvement after freshmen year could present conflicts for students, resulting in declining numbers in band.

# Methodology

### **Participants**

- High school band directors varying in age, ethnicity, and gender
- High school freshmen

## Analysis

All interviews were transcribed. Data from interviews and questionnaire were coded individually and collectively to answer research questions. (Creswell, 2007)

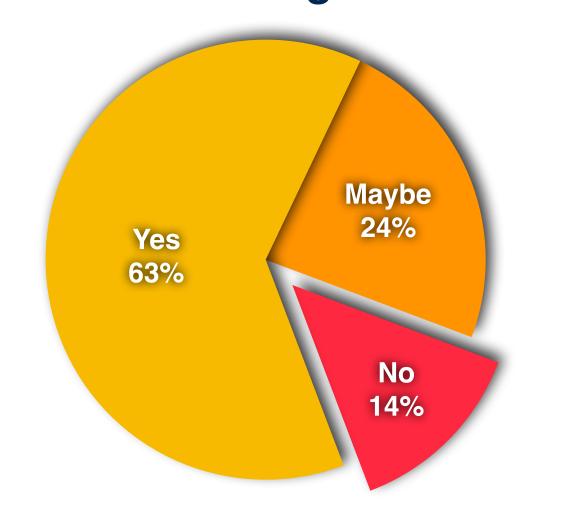
### Data

  n = 5 (30 minutes)

  Online 19 item questionnaire
  n = 148 (5-point Likert Scale & open ended responses)

## Conclusions

- Higher enrollment could occur when high school directors interact frequently with their feeder programs.
- ► Directors can develop and maintain activities that capitalize on the social aspects of band in high school such as chamber music ensembles, outreach performances and fundraisers, and trips.
- ► High school students should also be placed in mentoring positions for their feeder programs to help take away the "fear" factor of high school band.
